


Introduction

General Decline in Religiosity in the U.S

"Family influence is still, hands down, the No. 1 factor in transmitting religious faith in an enduring way. But in our current religious climate, it's often not enough. Clarify Conversational Aims

Scenario #1:

Person A has questions or doubts and is asking Person B for insights or direction.

Aim: Finding answers or understanding

Scenario #2:

Person A has left the church and is in conflict about that decision with Person B, who remains a committed member.

Aim: Reducing contention and healing the relationship



Scenario #1: Finding Answers or Understanding








